

2009 ANNUAL REPORT

2009, our commitment to education was renewed by several significant surprises reminding us of the potential of solidarity and generosity and offering new signs of hope. Early in the year, the 60 Million Girls Foundation in Montreal selected one of our projects in Honduras, "Educating Lenca Girls Today, Empowered Lenca Women Tomorrow", as one of only two projects that they support annually. The \$100,000 donation, linked exclusively to our three-year project in the mountainous region of San Francisco de Opalaca, is helping to build a dormitory, provide bursaries and facilitate empowerment programs that will enable hundreds of young girls in the area to be educated beyond grade 6. Our partnership with the 60 Million Girls Foundation is a meaningful one that supports our students' own efforts to overcome educational barriers related to gender inequality and cultural oppression. Such efforts are particularly vital given the fragility of human rights under the currently unstable political climate in Honduras.

In June, our co-founders Christine Gervais and Grant Perry travelled to Chincha Alta, Peru to visit the primary school and preschools that were reconstructed after the earthquake in 2007 thanks to the generous support of the Luke 4 Foundation. Amidst seemingly permanent ruin, they witnessed remarkable human courage, resilience and ingenuity in



homes, workplaces and education The students, staff and centres. parents at the schools invested considerable energy and detail in hosting assemblies in which their gratitude for their reconstructed learning spaces was thoughtfully expressed through personalized songs, poems and folkloric dancing. These celebrations of achievement amidst the visibly evident challenges were humbling and inspiring and they served as reminders of the lifechanging impacts of our collective efforts.



On November 13th, ACCESO International's work was recognized when our founder and president Christine Gervais was awarded the Lewis Perinbam Award by the World University Service of Canada (WUSC). This annual award commends a Canadian who has made a significant volunteer contribution international development. Although the award is for individual achievement, it is shared with all of ACCESO International's volunteers, donors, partners and students as an affirmation of the value of our solidarity among fellow human **WUSC** beings. We thank recognizing our collective commitment to education and social iustice.

2009 rewarded ACCESO has International with tributes that have been humbling and encouraging. But our satisfaction comes especially from witnessing the success of beneficiaries and knowing that even in difficult times, our donors continue to believe in our modest organization. Our solidarityoriented partnerships donors, volunteers, counterparts and recipients constitute profound sharing of both challenges and successes of our pursuit of hope-filled education and enduring human progress.

2009 Project Highlights

In 2009, ACCESO International operated in ten countries supporting various projects from pre-school to post-secondary education.

In **Bolivia**, we supported the library, homework centre, day care and post-secondary bursaries at Centro Integral WARMI in Cochabamba. We sponsored human rights workshops on citizenship, gender equality and the environment for women, youth and children.

In Canada, we provided back-to-school supplies for over one hundred low-income refugee and immigrant children and youth in the Ottawa area.

In Colombia, we provided computer support for a popular education primary school that serves extremely impoverished children in the Aguablanca area of Cali.

In the **Dominican Republic**, we provided educational materials, bursaries, computer programs and libraries in six primary schools in Yamasa and San José de Ocoa. We supported pre-natal education for Haitian families in the Yamasa area. We also assisted four young women and men with their post-secondary studies.

In Guatemala, we continued to support three pre-schools in the remote mountain Mayan villages of Sacala, Tioxya and Xenacojal.

In **Haiti**, we supported a homework centre that offers literacy support to atrisk, impoverished and orphaned children and youth at "Timoun Tèt Ansanm" in Verrettes.

In Honduras, we provided supplies and bursaries for an orphanage, a daycare, women's human rights workshops, a homework centre and a high school in El Progreso, for a primary school in Buen Ejemplo, and for a high school in La Lima. In Monte Verde, we supported human rights workshops, skills training, bursaries and a residence for Lenca girls and women.

In **Mexico**, we supported the construction and furnishing of a community homework and recreational centre for youth in San Luis Potosi.

In Nicaragua, we sponsored computer training programs for over 300 students and human rights workshops for women at Fundación Escuela Para Todos (School for All) in Managua.

In **Peru**, we sponsored five female postsecondary students and completed the postearthquake reconstruction and furnishing of 20 preschools in Chincha Alta. "A very big hello for all of you. It was an unforgettable day in my life. Upon returning to our house, my family laughed and cried.

Everything went great.

In 2009, ACCESO International's income before deferrals and endowments was \$217,601.99. As a reflection of ACCESO International's commitment to accountability and responsible charitable business, \$9,675 was raised by the founder, her family, volunteers and selected corporate sponsors to cover operational costs (e.g. administration, communications, fundraising) incurred during the 2009 fiscal year. This practice ensures that non-restricted receipted donations are allocated directly to our education projects.
