Appreciating Volunteers in Canada While Visiting Preschools in Peru

Since I was 3 years old, I I now better understand have been volunteering with ACCESO International, either by attending events (like walk-athons while still in a stroller) or by helping with fundraising or educational activities as soon as I was old enough, including the Amigos Club. Yet I was 20 years old by the time I was able to visit ACCESO's projects in person. In June of 2014, I travelled with my Aunt Christine (ACCESO's founder) to Chincha Alta, Peru where we visited many primary schools and early childhood education centres ACCESO helped to rebuild after the 2007 earthquake. I was able to see first-hand how all the hard work by volunteers in Canada directly affects the people we support. Observing how school, for so many people in need, is a refuge for safety, shelter and nutrition was so enlightening.

The children we met warmed my heart with their amazing smiles and positive energy. It was refreshing to see how they truly enjoyed going to school and I cherished our one-on-one conversations with teachers who shared their views on the project successes and on the areas that required improvement. how hands-on work and in-person communication are essential for effective project management. The importance of face-to-face contact also became evident when we visited the neighbourhoods benefiting from our health education projects. Speaking directly with project recipients about their experiences in the workshops and about the health issues that concerned them the most showed me the importance of ACCESO's inclusive efforts to consult project participants in order to ensure greater efficiency in project coordination.

In addition to opening my eyes to more readily appreciate the relative privileges of Canadian students, this trip was an amazing opportunity that taught me important lessons in international development - my area of study at the University of Ottawa. It was especially incredible to see how much a volunteer-based organization like ACCESO International can accomplish. I now have no doubt that the combined efforts of volunteers, partners and donors have an undeniable effect on the educational wellbeing of all the students we support in Peru.









Project Highlights

In 2014, ACCESO International supported projects from preschool to post-secondary levels in seven countries.

In Canada, we provided back-toschool supplies for over one hundred low-income refugee and immigrant children and youth in the Ottawa area.

In the **Dominican Republic**, we provided educational materials, bursaries, computer programs and libraries at six primary schools in Yamasá. We supported pre-natal and health education for Haitian families in the Yamasá and Consuelo areas. We also assisted three youth with their post-secondary studies.

In Guatemala, we supported three pre-schools in the mountain Mayan villages of Sacala, Tioxya and Xenacojal.

In Haiti, wesponsored health education workshops in Port-au-Prince, the post-earthquake reconstruction of primary schools, as well as the educational programming at a homework centre that offers literacy support to at-risk, impoverished and orphaned children and youth in the Verrettes area.

In Honduras, we provided supplies and bursaries for a daycare, women's and children's human rights workshops, a homework centre and a high school in El Progreso. In Monte Verde and La Esperanza, we supported human rights workshops, skills training, a sewing centre, bursaries and two residences for Lenca girls and women.

In **Nicaragua**, we provided office equipment for a computer training school for marginalized students in Managua.

In **Peru**, we sponsored health education workshops, and we completed the replenishment of educational materials for the 24 preschools that we helped to reconstruct after the earthquake in Chincha Alta.

Alfredo: A Peruvian Boy Who Inspired Me

One of the most valuable lessons that I learned on my trip to Peru had less to do with project efficiency in international development work and more to do with heartfelt inspiration and reciprocity. During one of our primary school visits, we first encountered the students, not in their classrooms, but on their neighbourhood streets as they led a walk promoting the environment. At the very end of the parade of students, I noticed a boy whose participation in the walk was laboured by a visible limp, yet his enthusiasm was energizing. Upon witnessing his determination, I immediately chose him as the boy to whom I would give my brother's favourite sweater which he asked me to share while in Peru. When we arrived at the school, we requested to meet the boy; we learned that his name was Alfredo. Through a tearful, yet joyful, exchange translated by my Aunt Christine, I explained to Alfredo how special it was to meet him and to share my brother's favourite



sweater with him. We spoke about his experience in school and his access to education overall. Sharing the sweater became so much more than an act of giving. It represented a memorable moment where I was inspired by a boy's perseverance against considerable odds.



Notes to Summary Financial Statements

Year ended December 31, 2014

1. Mission:

ACCESO International (ACCESO) is a non-governmental charitable organization that promotes and enables greater access to education in Latin America and the Caribbean by providing bursary assistance to individuals, as well as supplies and books to schools, libraries and education centres. It was founded in 1996, and was incorporated as a not-for-profit organization under Part II of the Canada Corporations Act effective March 21, 2003. Effective June 18, 2013, ACCESO continued its articles of incorporation from the Canada Corporations Act to the Canada Not-for-Profit Corporations Act. ACCESO is a registered charitable organization under paragraph 149(1)(f) of the Income Tax Act and is exempt from income taxes.

2. Summary financial statements:

The summary financial statements are derived from the complete audited financial statements, prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, as at December 31, 2014 and for the year then ended.

The preparation of these summary financial statements requires management to determine the information that needs to be reflected in the summary financial statements so that they are consistent, in all material respects, with or represent a fair summary of the audited financial statements.

These summarized financial statements have been prepared by management using the following

- (a) whether information in the summary financial statements is in agreement with the related information in the complete audited financial statements; and
- (b) whether, in all material respects, the summary financial statements contain the information necessary to avoid distorting or obscuring matters disclosed in the related complete audited financial statements, including the notes thereto.

Management determined that the statements of changes in net assets and cash flows do not provide additional useful information and as such have not included them as part of the summary financial statements.

Treasurer's Discussion On Accountability And Authenticity

As a reflection of ACCESO International's commitment to accountability and responsible charitable business, \$7,451.00 was raised by the founder, her family, volunteers and selected corporate sponsors to cover operational costs (e.g. administration, communications, fundraising) incurred during the 2014 fiscal year. This practice ensures that non-restricted receipted donations are allocated directly to our education projects. A complete version of our 2014 Audited Financial Statements is available upon request.
